What is a Forensic Exam?

A sexual assault medical forensic exam is an evidentiary medical exam performed after a sexual assault.

You have the right to a forensic exam after sexual assault. The exam does two things:

- Provides sensitive and thorough medical care
- Collects evidence that may be helpful to the prosecution of your case

Where will it happen, and who can be with me?

- In Tehama County, most forensic exams are performed in a designated room at St. Elizabeth Hospital.
- You have the option of providing your own transportation, arranging for a ride from a friend or family member, or law enforcement ordering the exam may offer transportation.
- In the room with you will be a medical examiner who is trained to be sensitive to survivors of sexual violence.
- You have the right to have a certified sexual assault advocate present who can maintain privileged communication and will have knowledge of medical rights and the criminal legal¹ system.
- In addition to a sexual assault advocate, you may also have a support person such as a friend or family member with you.
- The decision is yours alone regarding which non-medical personnel are in the exam room with you. You may ask anyone to leave at any time.

¹ The sexual assault advocate is the only one whose conversations with you are "privileged" under law. What you tell the advocate is confidential; law enforcement cannot compel the advocate to reveal privileged information.



What happens during a Forensic Exam?

- Remember, you have the right to refuse any part of the exam at any time.
- A sexual assault advocate will meet you at the hospital. The advocate can explain the process of the exam as well as your rights and choices.
 It is your choice whether the advocate stays with you in the exam room.
- The medical examiner will explain the exam and you will be asked to provide informed consent.
- You will be asked to describe the events of the assault. These answers will then direct the course of the medical exam.
- The exam begins with a general health check: blood pressure, heart rate, etc.
- Physical evidence is collected from head to toe, in the form of hair and oral swabs, to identify both your DNA and that of the person who assaulted you. A lamp is used to look for evidence of semen or saliva.
- A pelvic exam may be done, and potentially an internal exam. You have the right to stop the exam at any moment, if it becomes too physically or emotionally painful. The sexual assault advocate is present to support you during the exam.
- Photographs may be taken of physical evidence (e.g. bruises, lacerations). These photos are focused on a small part of your body and attached only to your forensic exam kit case number to protect your identity.

What happens after a Forensic Exam?

- Once the evidence is collected, it becomes a part of a forensic kit that is signed over to the police. When the police finish their investigation, the evidence is turned over to the District Attorney's Office.
- In Tehama County, a sample from the forensic kit is forwarded to the Department of Justice for rapid DNA processing.
- The District Attorney's office will make a decision regarding the case. If the case moves forward and enters criminal court, you may be called to testify as a witness.
- You are entitled to a copy of the forensic exam form when it is complete, along with a copy of the initial crime report related to your assault if requested, in writing.
- Your sexual assault advocate will contact you within 72 hours after the exam to follow up and provide any additional advocacy, counseling, services and referrals as needed.
- You may qualify for Victim Witness
 Benefits as a victim of a crime. A victim
 advocate from the District Attorney's
 Office should contact you regarding
 these benefits and court case
 information after your crime report has
 been filed.
